"For the past few years I have worked with Christian Aid to get a team together for the Edinburgh kiltwalk. The middle distance (around 14 miles) leaves from Musselburgh Links, and as At Andrew's High is the close to the starting point we gather the team and organise a short act of worship before we set off together. The middle distance walk is the

most popular, although some of the St Andrew's High folk thought that it was too short, and are planning the 21 mile walk this year. There's also a smattering of people who walk the short distance (five miles) from the shore between Granton and Crammond. The finishing point for all walkers is Murrayfield It would be great if we were able to have a greater participation from Lothian and Borders churches."

"The Church of Scotland ministry in Rome embraces providing worship in English for all people who identify as Presbyterian or Reformed in tradition. The congregation comprises many folk originally from Ghana or Cameroon as well as a handful of Scots and some people from America or other parts of Europe. It is normal to have more visitors than regulars on any given Sunday. St Andrew's Rome is a typical city church with the majority of its members living a considerable distance from the church. Many have a commute of 90-120 minutes each way to attend worship.
